

MALLINCKRODT (“MNK”) OPIOID PERSONAL INJURY TRUST FUTURE CLAIMANTS FAQs

These FAQs are meant to simplify the description of the Personal Injury Claim submission and review process to facilitate Claimant and Law Firm understanding, and are not all inclusive. However, the actual Plan, PI Trust Distribution Procedures and Trust documents are controlling, and these FAQs will evolve and be edited as the Trust administration proceeds.

1. Who is eligible to file a future claim?

For PI Claims:

You (or a deceased person on whose behalf you are filing a PI Claim) must have (i) used an opioid that was manufactured by the Debtors prior to the June 16, 2022, Effective Date and (ii) suffered injury.

PI Claims must be filed before the Personal Injury Trust closes, which is anticipated to be approximately 10 years after the Effective Date, or June 15, 2032. However, the Personal Injury Trust could close earlier.

For NAS PI Claims:

A NAS PI Claim can be filed by (or on behalf of) a person who has been diagnosed by a licensed medical provider with a medical, physical, cognitive or emotional condition resulting from such person’s intrauterine exposure to opioids or opioid replacement or treatment medication, including but not limited to the condition known as neonatal abstinence syndrome (“NAS”). Only NAS PI Claims based on injuries or facts occurring prior to the filing of the NAS PI Claim Form are eligible for recovery.

A NAS PI Claim must be filed within 3 years after the Effective Date, or by June 15, 2025.

2. Is there any difference in the admission criteria between present and future claimants?

No, except for the timing issues described in response to Question 1.

3. Will the present and future claimants be paid the same amount?

That is the intent of the Trust. However, this goal involves projecting current and future expenses and claims so that the Trust may begin to pay claims before the Trust closes. As a result, there will be a degree of risk that present and future Claimants are not paid the same amount.

4. If I am a future claimant, is there any hurry for me to file claims prior to the above deadlines?

Yes. Claims are processed and probably will be paid close to the order in which they are filed. Therefore, the sooner you file your claim, the more likely you are to be paid before claims that are filed after yours.
